Anderson 3 cartoons for £60

'The Kelmscott Press Mailing List' (William S. Peterson and Sylvia Holton Peterson, *The Kelmscott Chaucer: A Census* [New Castle, DE: Oak Knoll Press, 2011], 227, nos. B.20, B.21 & B.22) lists three Andersons:

Anderson, R., & Company, 14 Cockspur Street, Charing Cross.

Anderson, Miss S., 46 Warwick Gardens, Kensington, W. This is the Sara Anderson whom I list.

Anderson, Theodore, Kit-Kat Club, Belfast.

Harben 2 cartoons for £80

'The Quaritch Ledger' listing purchasers of the Kelmscott Chaucer (Peterson, 223, no. A.31): H. A. Harben, 107 Westbourne Terrace, London W.

James Mann 8 cartoons for £315, 1 cartoon as gift

Peterson, 18-19, no. 1.14: He owned a Kelmscott Chaucer on vellum. Born c. 1852, he was a son of the founder of Mann, Byars, and Company, a large Glasgow wholesale and retail firm selling clothes and household goods. He lived at Castlecraig, an Adam house in Peeblesshire.

McClurg & Co. 14 cartoons for £278.20

Peterson, 56, no. 2.83: George Millard (d. 1918), who had met WM and was a friend of Cobden-Sanderson and Sydney Cockerell, was an employee of McClurg's bookshop in Chicago, where he met and married Alice (1873-1938), moving eventually to Pasadena where they became important dealers of English Private Press books from their Frank Lloyd Wright house, La Miniatura.

Noble 2 cartoons + 3 scale drawings for £63.15.0

William Noble (1838-1912), Treasurer of the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board in Liverpool, owned a complete set of Kelmscott titles, including the Chaucer (Peterson, 66, no. 2.109).

'The Quaritch Ledger' recording copies of the Kelmscott Chaucer sold before publication (Peterson, 224, no. A.75) lists a J. Noble, 14 Pall Mall, London S.W.

Ponsonby 2 cartoons for £29.4.0

'The Kelmscott Press Mailing List' (Peterson, 237, no. B.597) lists one Ponsonby: Ponsonby, E. (bookseller), 116 Grafton Street, Dublin.

Radcliffe 1 cartoon for £25

Sir Frederick Radcliffe (1861-1952), Liverpool solicitor and book collector, owned a Kelmscott Chaucer (Peterson, 65, no. 2.107).

Roger 1 cartoon for £35

'The Kelmscott Press Mailing List' (Peterson, 237, no. B.637) lists one Rogers: Rogers, Mrs F. Newman, Rainscombe, Pewsey, Wiltshire.

Van Ingen 30 cartoons for £728

E. H. Van Ingen of the large New-York importing house of E. H. Van Ingen & Co. ('That "British Gold" Story: A Wilkesbarre Editor Sued for Libel by E. H. Van Ingen,' *The New York Times* [24 March 1893, no pagination]). His sale at Sotheby's on 13 February 1928, *The property of the late E. H. Van Ingen, Esq., New York City*, contained two Kelmscott Chaucers (Peterson, 161, Catalogues no. 4.234). He lived at 9 East 71st Street, New York City (*Club Women of New York*, 1906-1907, entry for Mrs E. H. Van Ingen). According to Linda Parry he ordered a tapestry from Morris & Co. (oral communication).

Wilkinson 1 cartoon for £30

Peterson, 29, no. 2.16: a copy of the Kelmscott Chaucer owned by Norman Wilkinson (1882-1934), a stage designer who had studied at the Birmingham School of Art with Edward Taylor, Arthur Gaskin and Henry Paine.

Peterson, 146, Unlocated copies no. 3.199: Kelmscott Chaucer sold by Thomas Read Wilkinson, Sotheby's London, 25 April 1904.
